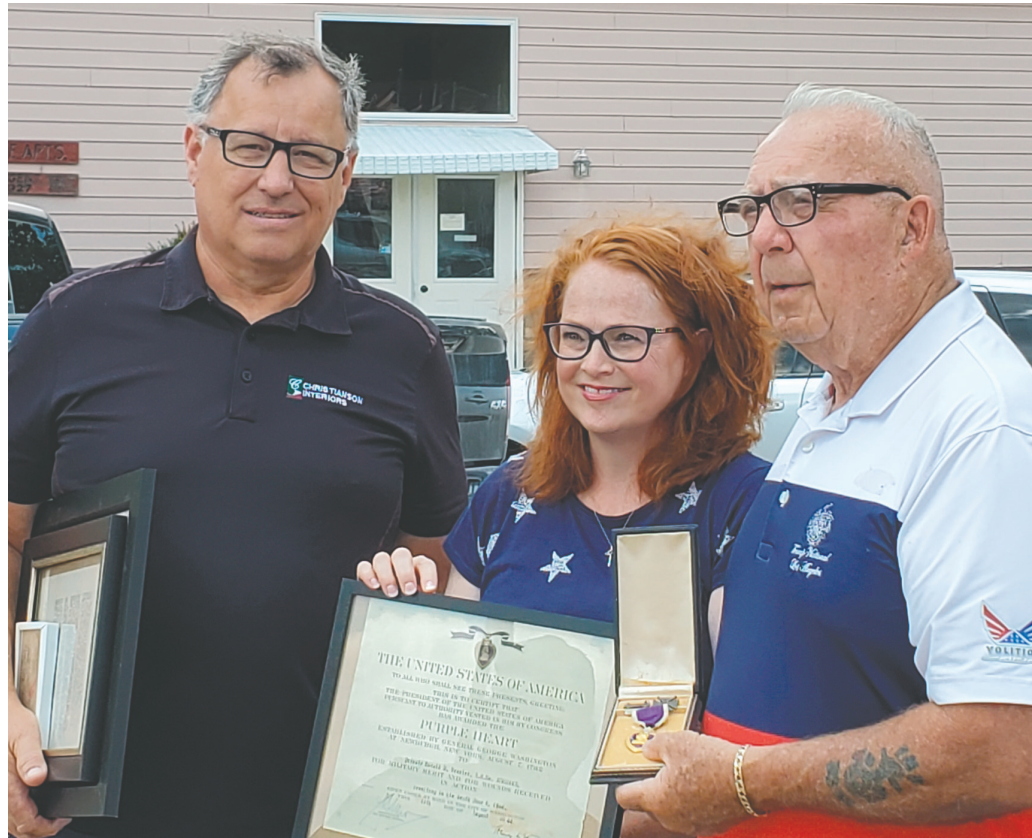

Searching for a soldier's family

On a trip to an Albert Lea antique store recently, Bill Clark, Lake Mills, came upon a few precious items. There were two documents or papers rolled inside a cardboard tube, that had been bestowed on someone called Pvt. Harold D. Frazier, U.S. Army—a soldier who was killed in action on D-Day, June 6, 1944, in France.

A veteran himself, Clark knew how much those papers would mean to a family member of Frazier's and vowed to try to find someone related to him.

Clark's good friend, Leon Christianson, a non-veteran (also from Lake Mills), an avid supporter of veterans and the military, got the information out on the internet.

"I put the information Bill found, on Facebook (June 15)," said Christianson, "and it literally went from coast to coast. The post was shared 533 times, and amazingly, reached a relative."

Linda Frazier Waalkens, a niece of Harold's . . . lost her dad (Elmo Frazier—Harold's brother) at a young age, yet had memories of going to visit her uncle's grave with her dad. Her dad was instrumental in making sure she understood the importance of her uncle Harry's service.

"One thing that stuck out in my mind, was that he made sure I knew about my Uncle Harry, and I have memories as a kid of going down to the cemetery in Mason City," said Linda. "Most of my family was small anyway, and now they're gone."

After hearing about Clark's find, she looked around in her dad's things, and found a box that she didn't know was there.

"I just about fainted when I found the box of memorabilia," said Linda. In it, she found a number of old letters, postcards from WWII, other personal effects, and Harold's purple heart.

So, the trio of Clark, Christianson and Linda, decided to meet at the Arlington Park memorial to exchange information, and for Linda to be presented the purple heart certificate, and a thank you for service (In Grateful Memory of Frazier), which was signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, and the label off the cardboard roll; each of which Christianson took upon himself to frame.

They arranged the meeting for Tuesday, June 29. When she arrived, Linda laid out the memorabilia she had, on the tailgate of her pickup, for Clark and Christianson to look at. Clark read a couple of letters, and then read the purple heart award certificate and the thank you from the President, out loud to the small group gathered there. The small group included Linda's husband, Michael, her cousin, Julie Courier (and husband, Gus), and a few veterans.

"It was really an exhilarating high for all of us . . . getting these documents back to Linda and her family. It was neat how the whole community came together to embrace this whole thing," said Christianson.

Local historical society in need of members/volunteers to continue work

The Lake Mills Area Historical Society (LMAHS) is requesting the community's help. The society is in need of new members, volunteers, and donations to continue their work in preserving the Burnap Country School and the 1901 Victorian House and Gardens. Membership numbers have dwindled over the years and the small group is unable to do the work that is needed. The society currently has to hire all repairs and much of the maintenance to the gardens. This has resulted in the elimination of portions of the gardens.

In 1999, one of the last country school buildings in the area was to be demolished. A group of teachers began work to preserve this part of educational history. The school was moved six miles and placed on donated land on N. Mill St. A basement was dug and the interior was restored and furnished, keeping original features if possible. Community members donated items and stories of country school life. Each spring, grade school classes visit the Burnap Country School and the 1901 Victorian House, and are amazed and full of questions about the history of these places. It is a great educational tool for children to see what school life was like before all the modern technology they are accustomed to.

In 2007, the historical house built by Soren and Anna (Bolstad) Larson in 1901 came up

for sale. This house played an important part in Lake Mills serving as a hospital, nursing home, and private residence. Seeing this as a great opportunity to preserve Lake Mills history for future generations, Sandy DeVries contacted members of the LMAHS and taking a step of faith, they procured financing to purchase the house from a local bank.

Following the purchase, work began on restoring and furnishing the 1901 Victorian House and creating the gardens. It is now a popular attraction to rent for bridge luncheons, bridal and baby showers, graduation parties, weddings and wedding rehearsal dinner parties. In addition, members of the LMAHS host the annual July Jubilee Wine Tasting and Holiday Open House fundraising events at the Victorian House. Unfortunately, the annual wine-tasting fundraiser was not held in 2020 due to COVID-19.

Throughout the years, many grants have been awarded and area businesses and individuals have been very generous with donations, but due to dwindling membership, the future of the house and school are now uncertain.

Community Night begins downtown at 6 p.m. on Friday, with lots of family activities planned. The Little Mr. and Miss July Jubilee Contest will begin at 6:30 p.m. Goodies will be handed out to all entrants and winners will help lead the parade on Saturday.

The Leonard Fjelstad Memorial Complex (located on the east end of Lake Mills, just off Milton Ave.) will host a couple of events this weekend. At 6 p.m. on Friday, the Parents for DC will hold a bean bag tournament fundraiser. The men's slow pitch softball tournament begins Saturday and continues Sunday. Proceeds will benefit the Lake Mills Park and Rec Department.

The Murphy Brothers Band performs downtown at 8 p.m. Friday evening. This is a free concert and all are welcome to kick back and relax. At 11 p.m. Dietrich Entertainment will spin some tunes for an After Party until midnight.

Start your morning with a nice walk/run/stroll Saturday

morning with the annual July Jubilee 5K. Registration begins at 6:45 a.m.

The July Jubilee parade begins at 10:30 a.m. The route will go west down Main St. to Lake St., south down Lake St. to 10th Ave. E., then east past the Lake Mills Care Center.

After the parade, enjoy some food and free entertainment at Oakwood Park. The Parents for D.C. community picnic fundraiser will be serving from 11:30 a.m. until gone.

Swallow Coffeehouse will be open Friday and Saturday, 6 a.m.-Midnight and Sunday, 8 a.m.-Noon. Live music will be performed Saturday from 2-3 p.m. They will be serving coffee drinks, a full bar, and cotton candy.

A bags tournament will begin at Noon, Saturday, in front of 5 Alarm Brewery. Prizes will be awarded to first and second place finishers. Registration includes two admission wristbands to the street dance following the tournament.

Sip on long island ice teas or sangria, while shopping local vendors (Two Daughters Coffee, Southern Sunflower Boutique, and Perfectly Posh) and participate in a Chipped Inscriptions "make and take" at Gene's Place (101 N. Mill) on Saturday, from 1-5 p.m.

At 3 p.m. the Kid Power sanctioned pedal pull will be held at Oakwood Park.

Lazy Acre Vineyard, 4776 Bluebill Ave., will be offering live music Saturday, from 4-7 p.m.

The downtown beer garden opens at 7 p.m. on Saturday, with the Junk FM street dance beginning at 8 p.m. Junk FM delivers a high-energy show by a team of musician-performers, who just want to see how ridiculous the dance floor can get.

The weekend winds down Sunday at 8 a.m. with the annual American Legion Breakfast fundraiser at the Truman Helgeson Civic Center, 227 W. Main St. Enjoy a freshly-made breakfast and show support for local veterans.

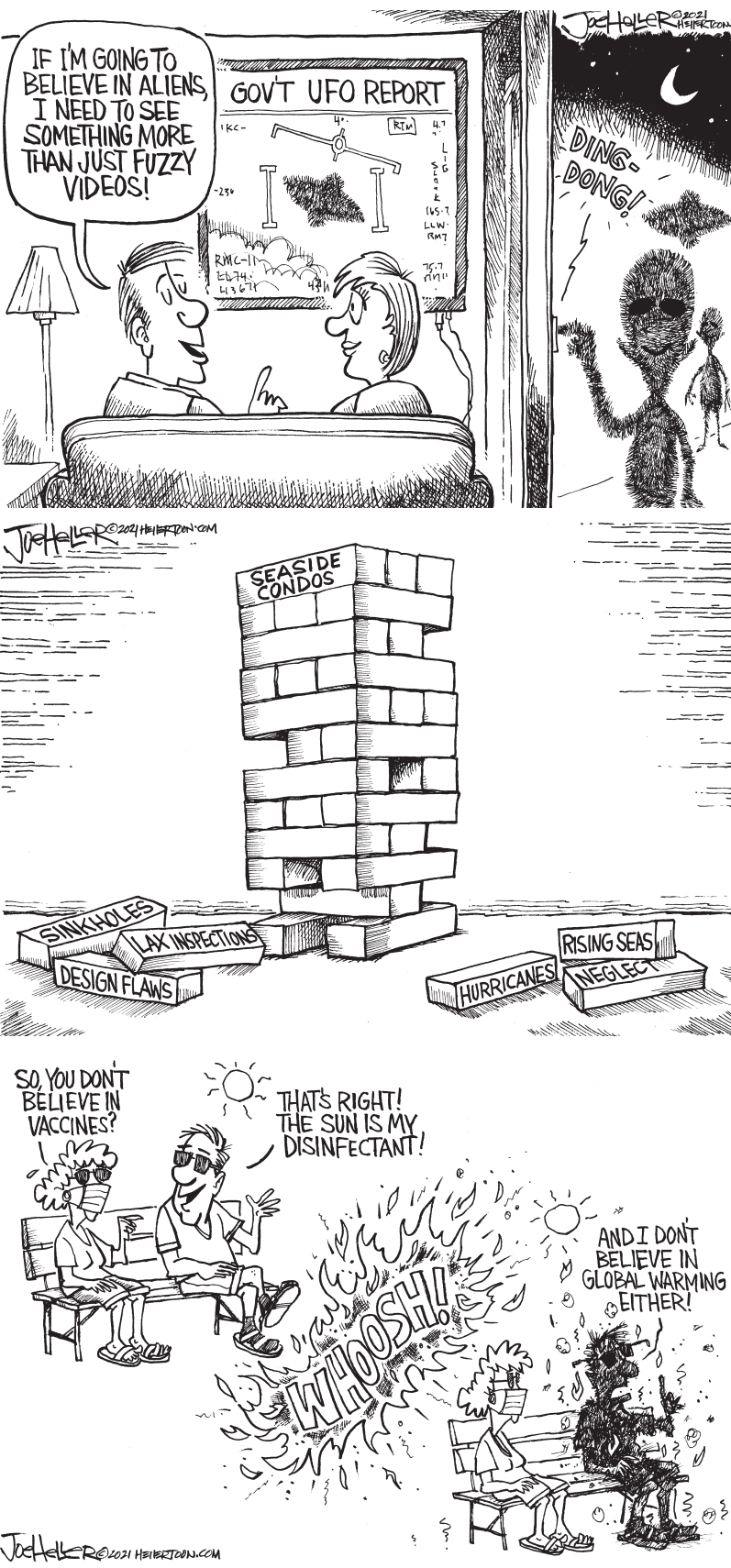
Normal hours are daily, 4-8 p.m., but hours will be extended during July Jubilee this weekend.

Why you need to keep wearing a mask in health care settings

COVID-19 vaccinations have led the way for many of us to return to a more normal way of living. It's been several weeks since the Centers for Disease Control shared relaxed guidance on mask wearing indoors for those who are fully vaccinated. MercyOne hospitals are now able to welcome back limited visitors to see their loved ones, with some relaxed restrictions.

But, we still require you to wear a mask in our health care settings. Here's why:

There is limited data on vaccine protection in people who are immunocompromised. This means there are many potentially vulnerable people in our hospitals, treatment centers and care locations. Wearing masks to reduce the spread of COVID-19 continues to be recommended by both the CDC and OSHA.

COVID-19 still exists. There are 29 states in the U.S. with rising numbers of cases this week. As recently as this past Tuesday, 43 Iowans were hospitalized with their first infection of the virus, and a fourth of them were under the age of 40.

There are many people who are not vaccinated. As of June 30, only 45 percent of Iowa's population has been fully vaccinated against COVID-19. We understand certain medical reasons may prevent an individual from completing the vaccine series or prevent them

from receiving the vaccine, yet our role in the health care industry is to protect every patient who enters our care facilities.

While vaccines offer some protection, the new, more highly contagious Delta variant can still spread rapidly among others. A county in Missouri saw a 210 percent spike in new cases during the month of June. Most of these cases were confirmed as the Delta variant, and most individuals needing to be hospitalized were not vaccinated.

We continue to encourage everyone who is able and qualifies to get vaccinated. COVID-19 vaccines are safe, effective and are the main reason for relaxed guidance by the CDC, as well as state and local governments. COVID-19 vaccines are widely available, and people ages 12 and up are now eligible. Consider scheduling your vaccine appointment today.

A Woman's Work

... They say it is never done, but that is just an excuse. Our lives should not be endless battle and belittlement.

In a statement, the court said that overturning the guilty verdict and blocking any further prosecution was "the only remedy that comports with society's reasonable expectations of its elected prosecutors and our criminal justice system."

In other words? It's expected. Men expect to be excused for any crimes they commit against women. No matter how severe their crimes, no matter how abundant their victims. And the sad reality is that, no, it ISN'T a surprise. An outrage, sure ... but not a surprise. It IS expected. Take one look at any number of those employed within our three branches of government and it's easy to understand the complacency of the court system and the sexual predators it protects.

On the other end of the spectrum, it is well-known amongst certain groups, but not necessarily widely known publicly, that former pop star Britney Spears has been engaged in a years long battle to free herself from the conservatorship of her father. Essentially, fighting for her own autonomy over decisions regarding her life and her body.

Some may remember a public incident of a bald Britney hitting a vehicle of a paparazzo that went viral (as much as anything could at the time), and say "She's unstable! The conservatorship makes sense!"

I have two words for you ... Kanye West. Enough said?

And even without him, celebrities are still human, as much as we like to objectify and glorify them. Mental illness can affect anyone, and all of us have a breaking point. Britney's so-called "break down" was extremely mild compared to many things we've now witnessed in this new technological age. People are going viral almost every day for some ridiculous outburst or altercation.

Advocating for more assistance for those suffering from mental illness via affordable healthcare (therapy, meds, etc.), and more education and acceptance of mental illness and neurodivergencies, is a positive step we should be taking.

NOT turning them into personal puppets via control and conservatorship.

It is also worth noting in this juxtaposition, that Britney has been, and is still currently, under the co-conservatorship of her father, Jamie Spears.

A man. An authority figure. There are not two criminal justice systems. No. There is only one. The one entity that either works for or against you, and the basis of the verdict all too often has nothing to do with the evidence, but rather, what decision will reap the most benefits and cause the most controversy.

Q&A: Government Watchdogs With U.S. Senator Chuck Grassley

Q: What is the Government Accountability Office (GAO)?

A: Legions of unsung heroes toil in the trenches, behind the scenes to protect taxpayer dollars and help members of Congress conduct our constitutional oversight responsibilities. One federal agency tasked with compiling facts, making recommendations and issuing legal opinions celebrates 100 years of serving the public on July 1. A century ago, the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) started its work as a federal watchdog. Tasked with a nonpartisan, fact-finding mission, the federal agency scrutinizes spending and follows the paper trail within the federal bureaucracy. Throughout my years of oversight, I've leaned on the GAO to check into potential mismanagement and help identify waste, fraud and abuse. Its policy experts provide objective audits on government operations to inform policymakers about the cost and effectiveness of federal programs. With more than \$6 trillion in the federal pipeline under the umbrella of pandemic relief, it's more important than ever to keep a tight leash on where those dollars are spent.

Recently, I've asked the GAO to conduct a review of the Nursing Home Compare website and Nursing Home Five-Star Rating System. When Americans look for long-term care facilities to care for a loved one, they ought to be able to trust information provided on the federal website to present accurate, useful and meaningful data. From my committee assignments in the U.S. Senate, I've conducted oversight and passed legislation to help prevent elder abuse and exploitation, such as abusive, humiliating social media posts and to prevent physical abuse and neglect of nursing home residents. Years ago, when I chaired the Senate Aging Committee, GAO reports helped expose substandard care in nursing homes. My oversight hearings helped enact reforms during the Clinton administration, including the launch of Nursing Home Compare, the online federal database for families to check nursing home compliance, staffing and inspection information. However, as with any government program, it's not a good idea to leave it on auto-pilot. The GAO flags issues for lawmakers and releases recommendations to federal agencies to improve effectiveness and protect tax dollars. Since Nursing Home Compare launched, the GAO has identified gaps to improve the website's utility for families. The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) updated this tool to include health care provid-

ers under one online umbrella, called Care Compare. Users may narrow their search by location and provider type to find information about specific health care providers, from nursing homes to hospice care, hospitals and other providers in local communities. I look forward to learning what the GAO finds in its investigation to make Care Compare more effective for families looking for information on nursing home care for a loved one.

Q: How else do government watchdogs help your oversight work?

A: Since the day I arrived in Congress, I've worked to bring Iowa's fiscal discipline to the policy tables in Washington, D.C. Keeping a tight-fisted grip on the purse strings means I work to keep a lid on the federal debt, pinch pennies when Congress hammers out the budget blueprint, and squeeze every tax dollar the federal government collects on income, wages and investment. With an unprecedented \$6.5 trillion spent in 2020-2021, it takes relentless oversight to track down wasteful spending and hold wrongdoers to account. To ensure taxpayer dollars are spent as Congress intended, we need all the eyes and ears on the ground we can get to help root out waste, fraud and abuse. That's why I've long championed whistleblower protections to protect our energy grid, pandemic relief, financial systems and tax compliance. I'm also working to strengthen the independence of Inspectors General (IG) and appreciate the important work of the GAO to help hold government accountable to the taxpayer. Whistleblowers who stick their necks out to report wrongdoing deserve protections for putting their careers and reputations on the line. The federal government has investigative teams in 73 offices of U.S. Inspectors General. Sometimes, it's necessary to keep the watchdogs on a tight leash to protect the integrity and independence of their mission. Congress depends on impartial investigations of IGs and the GAO to provide an independent, nonpartisan review of government programs and federal agencies. As a strong advocate for the American taxpayer, I lean on whistleblowers and government watchdogs to help me root out abuse and wasteful spending across the board, from the Pentagon, to federal farm payments, veterans benefits and Medicare and Medicaid. Every dollar lost to sticky fingers or mismanagement rips off the taxpayer and cheats a Medicare patient, veteran, unemployed worker or disaster victim from receiving assistance.

Block Party

Block party Sunday evening at the Northside Trailer Park turned out to be a big event. It started at 3 p.m. with games for the kids and bingo for the adults. The fee is \$50 per year for each dealer. This annual revenue to practically every community in Iowa will amount to an enormous total. The only change in present conditions, when cigarettes are sold freely throughout the state, will be that the dealers will pay a license and the smokers a tax. The new state law also provides strict regulations as to use of cigarettes by minors.

Conrad N. Nelson, who has been manager of the Farmers Elevator at Hanlontown, has been chosen as manager for the Farmers Elevator at Lake Mills. We are well acquainted with Mr. Nelson and know him as a progressive young businessman, thoroughly reliable, and a man who understands the elevator business. He is a fine fellow and will make good with our people. The directors could not have chosen a better man. Mr. Nelson took charge of the work here this week.

Announcements were received here last week regarding the marriage of Superintendent S.H. Berg to Miss Alphs Magdalene Meland, at Minneapolis, Minn., Thursday, June 30, 1921. Mr. Berg has made a host of friends in Lake Mills who will be glad to welcome him and his bride to our city on their return about August 1. Those from Lake Mills who attended the wedding were O.N. Stye and family, G.B.L. Stye and family, Prof. Hovland acted as best man, and Arthur Odden assisted as one of the ushers at the ceremony.

**75 years ago
July 3, 1946**

Writing and art on a professional basis are the occupations of two Lake Mills women, Mrs. Laura Baker, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L.W. Nelson, and Miss Adrien Stoutenburg, a friend of Mrs. Baker's. They have their residence on the L.W. Nelson farm just west of Lake Mills. Mrs. Baker has been interested in writing since she was a child but did not seriously take up a career of writing until about six years ago. She has written poetry,

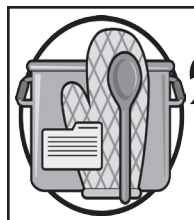

BLUEBERRY NUT BREAD

2 eggs
1 c. sugar
1 c. milk
3 Tbsp. shortening, melted
3 c. flour
1/4 tsp. salt
4 tsp. baking powder
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1 c. fresh blueberries

Beat eggs, add sugar gradually. Add milk and melted shortening. Sift flour, salt, baking powder, and add to liquid. Stir only enough to blend. Fold in nuts and berries. Pour into well-greased 5 by 12 inch loaf pan or 2, 3-1/2x7-1/2 inch loaf pans. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 1 hour or until done.

SUMMER SQUASH CASSEROLE

3-4 lbs. sliced yellow summer squash
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 c. sour cream
1/2 c. finely-chopped onion
1 can water chestnuts, sliced
Stuffing mix
1 stick margarine
Cook squash until tender. Drain. Cover bottom of casserole dish with 4 oz. stuffing mix. Mix the rest of the ingredients and put in dish. Melt 3/4 stick margarine and mix through. Sprinkle a little more stuffing mix over the top and pour remaining melted margarine over the top. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

UPSIDE DOWN PIZZA

2 lbs. ground beef
1/4 c. chopped onion
1 env. spaghetti sauce mix
16 oz. tomato sauce
1-1/2 c. Mozzarella cheese

1 c. sour cream
8 oz. can crescent rolls
2 Tbsp. melted butter
1/3 c. Parmesan cheese
Brown ground beef with onion, and drain. Add spaghetti sauce mix and tomato sauce. Simmer until heated through. Spread into a 9x13-inch pan. Layer with cheese and then sour cream. Top with crescent rolls (unrolled). Brush with butter and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake for 30 minutes. Serves 10-12.

SOUTHERN BANANA PUDDING

1 pkg. (4 svq. size) vanilla pudding and pie filling
2 lg. bananas, sliced
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
2-1/2 c. milk
25 vanilla wafers
Combine pudding mix, egg yolks and milk in a saucepan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat. Arrange layer of vanilla wafers on bottom and sides of a 1-1/2 qt. baking dish. Add a layer of banana slices and of pudding. Continue layering wafers, banana and pudding, ending with pudding. Top with meringue.

Meringue topping:

2 egg whites
Dash of salt
1/4 c. sugar
Beat 2 egg whites and a dash of salt until foamy. Slowly add 1/4 c. sugar, beating constantly until stiff shiny peaks form. Pile onto pudding. Seal edges; bake 5-10 minutes at 425 degrees, or until lightly browned. Arrange more banana slices around the edge, just before serving. Serve warm or chilled. Serves 8.

10U Lake Mills Travel baseball team remains undefeated

The Lake Mills 10U Travel Baseball team continued their winning streak last weekend by winning their home Lake Mills Classic Baseball Tournament, bringing their record to an impressive 13-0 on the season.

The Bulldogs started their undefeated season by competing in the Albert Lea Baseball Classic tournament the second week of May. Led by strong pitching and consistent hitting throughout the three-day tournament, the Bulldogs started the season strong by winning a Friday night game against LeSuer/Henderson from Minnesota.

The next day of competition started with a game against the Albert Lea Tigers. The Bulldogs entered the last inning trailing the Tigers 4-5, but the team came from behind by scoring four runs to earn a win. The last game of pool play was against a Rockford, Minn., team where the Dogs won 13-0 with a strong fifth inning of play. After pool play, the Bulldogs were seeded in the championship game against Austin. They capped off the weekend with a win, 7-3, to be crowned tournament champions.

The Bulldogs continued their winning streak two weeks later by taking first at the Clear Lake 10U Baseball tournament, May 29. In their first game against Rockwell, the Bulldogs scored seven runs in the fifth inning and limited their opponent to one for a final score 15-1.

In their second game against Humboldt, the Bulldogs faced a quality team that challenged the team's resilience, but the Bulldogs captured the win by four runs.

This win positioned them for a spot in the championship game

against the Mason City Outlaws. The championship game saw the Bulldogs continue their stout hitting throughout the lineup by defeating the Outlaws in two innings, 15-1.

The third tournament for the Bulldogs was held June 17-18 at the Mason City Merchants Invitational. The Bulldogs started hot on the first day of pool play, defeating Cedar Falls with a breakout inning where they scored four in the second inning and recorded the win, 8-2. They faced the Mason City Outlaws in their second game Saturday, where they again played good baseball, limiting the Outlaws to five runs and finishing with a 12-5 win.

The championship bracket play Sunday found the Bulldogs facing Cedar Falls again. This time, the Bulldogs fell behind 4-1 after the first inning of play, but they rallied with strong hitting and good defense. They racked up six runs in the next two innings to defeat their opponent, 10-7. With this win, the Bulldogs earned the number one seed in their bracket and played in the championship game against the Mason City Rampage, a team that had beaten the Bulldogs the last two years.

Unfortunately, weather hindered the completion of the championship game against the Rampage as the Bulldogs were only able to complete 2.5 innings of the six inning game. Even though the game ended early, the Bulldogs were crowned champions for the third time of the season.

The last tournament of the regular season for the 10U Lake Mills Travel Team was at their home field June 26. The Bulldog's first opponent, the Clear Lake Lakers,

started the game with an early 5-1 lead. The Bulldogs mounted a rally, and after the top of the 4th inning, the Bulldogs and Clear Lake Lakers were tied 8-8. In the bottom of the fourth, the Bulldogs' bats got hot and scored five more runs leading to a Bulldog win, 13-8.

Again, weather hindered the completion of the full tournament schedule; however, based on wins, the Bulldogs earned their fourth championship.

After 13 games and four tournaments, the Bulldogs have been crowned champions at all four tournaments and outscored their opponents 133 runs to 43 runs.

Coach Jeff Steele said, "This group is special and I'm proud of every one of them. On games when one of them is down, the rest of the gang is right here to pick them up and encourage them on to the next play."

The Bulldogs will compete in one more tournament, The Iowa Games, July 24-25. This tournament is a state-wide tournament in Des Moines that allows the Bulldogs to see new teams and provide excellent competition.

The team would not be possible without the support of local community businesses.

This local Lake Mills team, coached by veteran travel-team coach, Jeff Steele, consists of 11 players ranging from second to fourth grade.

Steele commented on the 11 players, "They are like a group of brothers which makes me smile because it reminds me of the group of kids I hung out with growing up, nicknames and all."


